MURAL DONORS - WE NEED TO HEAR FROM YOU

You were so quick to respond with your generous mural donation, but now we need you to tell us what to do with it. WOMEN'S SOFTBALL FIELD

When plans were made for the Grant modernization project, a men's baseball field and a women's softball field were included. Until the modernization project the women's softball team had used the Wilshire Park field a mile or so away from Grant. The Wilshire field was minimally adequate and necessitated extra logistics effort to haul equipment to and from as well as having only rudimentary restrooms and no electrical service. The men's baseball field was located on the Grant campus next to the PE building.

The modernization plan placed the new softball field in the field north of the school and the new baseball field was located between the school building and the football field in the bowl. During the design process the softball field project was removed as the site was deemed unsuitable. The new baseball field was built complete with artificial turf, fences, bull pens, pitching machines and sanitary bathrooms for players and fans.

The longtime softball coach **Deborah Englestad '82** and three students launched a discrimination lawsuit in federal court against the school, alleging a Title IX violation – failing to treat female student athletes comparably with male student athletes.

As a result, PPS approved a plan in Feb 2020 to construct a new softball field that shares space with the existing baseball field. The softball field will have duplicate dugout and backstop screens to match the baseball facilities. The city land use hearings officer approved the plans re lighting and sound system usage on June 17. Construction should begin by Oct 2021 with Spring 2022 softball to be on the new field.

PETE MOORE SCHOLARSHIP

Probably all U.S. Grant classes think theirs is the best, but the class of 1959 can be especially proud. Not only did they have the usual 10,20,30...60 year reunions, but honored one of their class members and student body President, **Pete Moore** with the annual Pete Moore Memorial Scholarship Golf Tournament beginning in 2009. The tournament drew fellow alumni from across the United States. **Gerry F. Spencer '59**, initiated the golf tournament and scholarship committee and continued to chair both events until his passing. Gerry was supported by fellow classmates, U.S. Grant staff and especially his wife, Rebecca.

Since that first tournament and fundraising effort, over \$170,000 has been awarded to outstanding Grant seniors who went on to 19 different institutions of higher education. The 11th and final PMMS Golf Tournament was held July 15, 2020 at Eastmoreland Golf Course.

The final round of scholarships will be awarded in 2022.

HISTORICAL HALLWAY PHOTOS



GRANT ALUMNI ACTORS SALLY STRUTHERS '65 AND TED ROONEY '79

Most of you know **Sally Struthers '65** from *All in the Family* fame, is a Grant alum. But did you know that another Grant alum, **Ted Rooney '79** is also an actor? He appeared in such films as, *Celtic Pride, Legally Blond, Big Fat Liar,* and at least 25 other films. On television, he played Dr. Tabash on *ER*, he also had roles on *Seinfeld, Chicago Hope, Star Trek: Voyager, Grimm, Portlandia*, and many other shows.

The show, *Gilmore Girls* is special. On *Gilmore Girls*, Rooney played the husband of a mismatched couple, Morey Dell, and Struthers played Babette Dell. The show ran from 2000 to 2007.

Rooney was vacationing in Mexico when he decided to check his answering machine. There were several messages from his agent asking him to call, each one more frantic. He called his agent and was told to get back to Los Angeles for an audition on Gilmore Girls.



When Rooney first met Struthers on the Gilmore set, he mentioned Portland Oregon. Her immediate response was, "Are you Ed Rooney's son?" She told him that his dad was one of her favorite teachers. They still keep in touch with each other and remain close friends.

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2021 HALL OF ACHIEVEMENT



ARTHUR JACKSON '42 was born in Cleveland OH and moved to Portland as a fifteen year old. At Grant, he earned letters in baseball, football and track. He enlisted in the Marine Corp as an infantryman and distinguished himself during the Pacific's New Britain campaign. Pres. Truman awarded Jackson the Medal of Honor for his role in a fierce battle lasting two months on the island of Peleliu. He received a two Purple hearts - one for injuries sustained on Peleliu and later in Okinawa. Four years later Jackson joined the Army as a commissioned officer, but a decade later returned to the Marines. As a company commander at Guantanamo Bay in 1961 he killed a pro-communist Cuban apparently in self-defense and buried the body in a shallow grave with the help of other Marines. The Defense Department launched an investigation, but it never gained traction. He was denied a court-martial to clear his name and quietly left the military. For

the first time publicly, Jackson said in a 2013 interview that he was ashamed of the killing but understood the treaty between the US and Cuba could have resulted in his detention in a notorious Cuban prison. Jackson is one of only three men in Oregon to have received the Medal of Honor and the only Grantonian! He died in Boise June 14, 2017 at 92 years of age.



JACOB TANZER '52 received his Juris Doctorate from the University of Oregon School of Law, and in the same year passed the Oregon bar. He also attended Stanford University and Reed College. In 1959, following graduation, Jake and fellow colleague Frank Granata established a small law practice in Portland, Oregon, Granata & Tanzer, and practiced law there for three years. In 1963, he joined the US Department of Justice, where he served as a Trial Attorney in the Organized Crime and Racketeering Division of Robert Kennedy's Justice Department. In 1964, he was sent to Mississippi as a member of the Civil Rights Division that was investigating the deaths of three civil rights activists: Andrew Goodman, James Chaney, and Michael Schwerner. This case, which would later become known as the Mississippi Burning case, was instrumental in the shaping of the Civil Rights movement, with the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibited racial segregation and extended full voting rights to all US citizens of voting age. The

following year, the Voting Rights Act of 1965 was also passed which further outlawed discriminatory voting practices. Also of note, the case became a symbol of Jewish American involvement and support of the Civil Rights movement, as both Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner were Jewish. Jake was a Deputy District Attorney for Multnomah County. In 1969, he was appointed by Governor Tom McCall as the first Solicitor General for the Oregon Department of Justice. In 1971, he became the first director of the Oregon Department of Human Services. He served as an appeals court judge for the Oregon Court of Appeals. From 1980 until 1982, he served as the 81st judge for the Oregon Supreme Court. He and his wife, Elaine Rhine started Elephant's Deli in 1979. Jake died in 2018.



MICHAEL "CHAPPIE" GRICE '66 was a drummer in the pep band, a class officer, a Boys' League officer and a member of varsity rally. Michael graduated from Cornell College of lowa and earned his Masters from Reed College. His extensive 40 year career includes being an educator, administrator, mentor, arts advocate, documentary filmmaker and gifted speaker. His numerous awards and commendations include the Educator of the Year in 2010 by the National Education Association and the Human Rights award from the Oregon Education Association in 2008. He is a member of the NAACP, the Urban League of Portland and the National Council on Educating Black Children. Nothing But Quality, his official website, offers professional development services to schools and learning institutions in urban areas. In addition to assisting with teaching strategies and learning concepts, the staff also offers educational consulting services. Michael currently resides in NE Portland.



MIKE HASSON '72 played on the state championship baseball team and was a member of the wrestling team. After graduating from the UofO, Mike began his real estate career in 1977. In 1983 he and two friends started their own company but in 1991 Mike broke away to start the Hasson Company Realtors with 12 agents. Mike was a self made salesman and a visionary whose company in 2020 had 2.2 billion in sales among 165 agents in 8 offices. A friend said that while Mike was a titan in the industry, he didn't act like it and wanted everyone to find success. Mike fought mesothelioma for ten years before dying in 2020.

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BEATRIZ SANTIAGO-PEREZ 2021 ROSE FESTIVAL PRINCESS

Beatriz Santiago-Perez was selected to represent Grant on the 2021 Rose Festival court. Born in Oaxaca, Mexico she plans on attending a four-year school to become a social worker so she can help others. She is the first in her family to attend high school. While at Grant, she received awards recognizing her GPA, and was named Student of the Month for October 2018.

On July 4th, Beatriz and her family lost everything in an apartment fire that also killed two men.

We all have an opportunity to help Beatriz and a current student (Malik). These young

Grantonians, with their families, have experienced horrible losses as a result of the fire that destroyed two apartment buildings on 22nd and Weidler. SANTIAGO FRANCO 2021 WILLIAM T. FLETCHER AWARD



The William T. Fletcher Award, the most prestigious honor given to a graduating senior, was awarded this year to **Santiago Franco**. The award is named for Grant's first principal who, although serving for only four years before an early death, Fletcher was so beloved that students spearheaded a campaign to raise funds for the murals that had flanked the auditorium stage.

What would Fletcher have looked for in a student to receive this award?

Class leader? Check! Santiago was co-president Movimento Estudiatil Chicanx de Aztlan and was often the student to "rev" the student body during assemblies.

Superior academics? Check! Santiago will attend University of Portland as a Presidential Scholar in the fall.

Friendly? Check! When introduced as the award recipient, Principal McGee recalled how Santiago could be seen and heard in the halls humming Sinatra tunes with a smile for all.

Extracurricular activities? Check! Santiago is a nationally recognized boxer.

Basketball was Santiago's introduction to youth sports before trying football; but neither resonated with him like boxing. He joined the Knott Street Community Center boxing team when he was nine and trained there until his father, James, opened Rip City Boxing. Santiago has won many state and regional championships and participated this past summer in the Pan American games. His team of thirteen all qualified for the national championship to take place November 2021.

Santiago feels Grant prepared him for college although Covid was a hindrance. HIs most challenging class was AP English taught by Ms. McFaul Amadoro who "always pushed us to be our best and to be confident with our knowledge". His advice to seniors is to be aware that Senioritis is very real.

How does he accomplish all of this? He strives for excellence in the ring, school, and in life with his personal motto "hard work beats talent when talent doesn't work hard."

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THE CONSTITUTION TEAM AND COVID

Grant High School has had a national caliber Constitution Team since 2000. The team is 30 plus senior students of all genders. Those students divide into 6 units and study the Constitution, prepare 4 minute oral responses to questions provided by the Center for Civic Education. The questions would be a challenge for most law students. Unit members also prepare for 6 or more minutes of questions from judges, questions the students have not heard before. The questions test whether the students have only a surface understanding or have truly grappled with the difficult issues of history, law and politics.

The success of the students is the product of intensive reading, writing (several drafts and corrections) and repeated practice on oral presentation. The team works with a teacher (currently Angela Di Pasquale) and as many as 10 to 12 volunteer coaches, many of whom are lawyers or judges in Portland. In recent years several young professionals who were past members of the team have also joined the coaching staff. Before the pandemic, the team would meet at least two times a week, with one meeting being a small group meeting of the unit members at a home of a coach or student. Students would also meet on their own or more often as the state or national competitions approached.

All of this preparation, prior to the pandemic, was done in person and face to face with students and coaches. Team members learned a life lesson - success at the state level led to even more work and preparation on a whole new set of questions for the national competition. That competition occurs in Washington D.C. Parents and friends learn that success in Oregon means raising \$80,000 to pay for the costs of the 4 day trip to the nation's capital.

In the last two years, the pandemic changed many things, but did not cause the program to end. Instead, consistent with new rules, in person meetings of students and coaches and the competition itself could not be in person. Preparation and competition occurred on Zoom, with everyone – competitors, coaches and judges appearing on Zoom. Sadly, this also meant that the fun and excitement of a trip to Washington D.C. for the Oregon winner did not occur.

However, in the past two years the Grant team has gone to "Nationals" both years. This year the team placed second in the nation. The team is proud of representing Oregon so well in a national competition and maintaining the tradition of top three finishes. Every member of the team benefited from the intense learning and skill sharpening. Past team members have consistently testified that this preparation prepares them for success in college and beyond – one student even thanking a coach for how that training helped prepare her for the successful defense of her PhD thesis. That thesis was in geology. Many of the team members go on to study and work in areas not directly related to law and the Constitution. However, they are all better prepared to be citizens

The pandemic meant personal contact (including home - made cookies at the homes of some coaches) was lost. But for many it meant that self - motivation skills had to be sharpened. Also, techniques for sharing time in the answering of questions (a key scoring point) had to be altered as physical proximity was changed to only screen appearances. Full team and unit camaraderie was not as easy to create, but Zoom camaraderie was produced. A real benefit was that guest presentations to the team were easier to arrange and student travel time was replaced with learning time. Finally, the cost of national competition was eliminated. Everyone hopes that burden will return. The pandemic also did not interrupt the fact that the teamwork is among all genders. That is not possible for many Grant team activities. It has led, in at least one instance, to the marriage of two Constitution Team members.

A hallmark of the Grant program in the past has been the presence and support at the competition from many family members, former members and others. This was not possible in the last two years but will hopefully return

this coming year. That support is part of broad support in the Grant community for the Constitution Team. Repeated success over the last 20 plus years has led to the entire neighborhood offering support. Grade school students hear about the program from teachers, family members and neighborhood team members.

All Grant alumni can be justifiably proud of the teachers, administration and students at Grant who are associated with the Constitution Team.
